Henry C. Lee Institute

The new Henry C. Lee Institute is expected to open on University of New Haven's campus in Fall 2010. This new institute will house advanced forensic and crime-scene technologies that are not readily available to students or law enforcement officials around the country. Some of these new resources include ground-penetrating radar, high-intensity laser for bullet-trajectory reconstruction, and a teleforensic satellite internet system. These resources will be used to teach criminal justice, forensic, and law students how to solve crimes. The institute will also serve as a location where police officers and investigators can utilize the equipment and laboratories to solve crimes. Dr. Henry C. Lee is the founder of the Forensic Science program at the University. Come to the library to investigate all the resources we have on criminal justice, forensics, and law, such as *Physical Evidence in Forensic Science* and *Advances in Fingerprint Technology*, both by Henry C. Lee. To find out more about forensic science and related topics, search library databases such as Criminal Justice Periodicals, Homeland Security Digital Library, or FORENSICnetBASE/LawENFORCEMENTnetBASE .

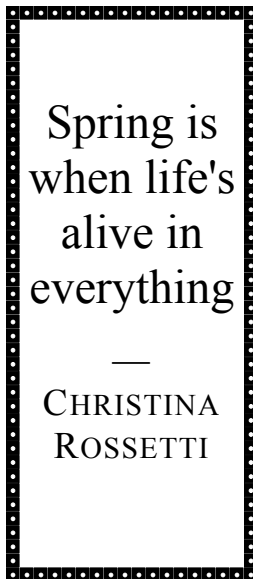

Library Computer Resources

The Peterson Library has nearly 100 computers to serve the UNH community. Six iMacs are available on the west wall of the entry-level Library Commons and they have all the i-features that Apple offers. SPSS Version 18 has been installed on all 54 PC workstation computers on the entry level, as well as on the 36 laptops which you can borrow at the Circulation Desk for use in the Library. For quick service, we also have two print-only stations near the printers and a catalog-search terminal by the Information Desk. We now also have a color printer available as well as three individual print stations. In the Subject Database list on the Library web site, a new option in the News Sources group is Digital Microfilm Newspapers from ProQuest.
